It seems we keep saying welcome to another 'bumper edition', but this newsletter is the largest we have ever produced for one half term as we have so many stories to share. During the course of the year we hope you have enjoyed reading about the experiences of the students and staff, which gives an overview of the work we do at The Ramsey

As another academic year comes to an end, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support. Once again, this year has been exceptionally busy; the increased range of opportunities and activities available combined with excellent first quality teaching has allowed students

to develop not only their academic skills and knowledge, but a variety of life skills which are so important for their future.

It is with great regret and sadness I have to inform you that recently Mrs Elizabeth Ward passed away following a short illness. She was a great supporter of Ramsey: fulfilling the role of Chair of Governors for six years before relinquishing the post last year due to ill health. She regularly visited the school, supported events and spoke to students about their aspirations.

The Academy has gone from strength to strength and in January we received a visit from Ofsted, who judged that the education provision we provide remains 'good'. Our aim is still to be classed as 'an outstanding school in the heart of the community', not necessarily in terms of an Ofsted grading but based on the judgement of our students, parents and local community.

As Year 11 leave to start the next stage of their education, training, or employment we wish them 'good luck' and look forward to their GCSE results in August. The new Year 7 students have already completed their 'induction days' and are looking forward to joining us. In September we will have nearly 170 Year 7 students; as with last year, well above our published admission number, indicating that the Academy is becoming the 'first choice' for many local families.

We have extended our network of 'community partners' who visit the Academy and also offer our students the opportunity to visit them on site. The students, via their Houses, have arranged a wide variety of activities to raise money for charity. This year over £7000 has been donated to the nominated charities: Smile of Aaron, Blue Heart, The Breck Foundation and Essex Air Ambulance.

We have continued to fulfil our commitment to provide a broad range of experiences both in and out of the classroom. This is important as it enables students to develop a greater awareness of the world around us and the opportunities available. In this edition, the reports highlight the breadth of activities which challenge the students' thinking and often takes them out of their 'comfort zone'.



#### St Andrew's Flower Festival






## Ramsey Students Speak Out at the North Essex Regional Final

The Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge aims to ensure that young people have the confidence and skills to speak aloud, and that they know the importance of their voice and why they deserve to be heard. Through public speaking sessions with specialists from the Speakers Trust, students in Year 10 can develop key attributes with their peers and learn what makes a good speech. Of course, content of a speech is very important, but the way a speech is delivered is key as well - which is where mentors from the Speakers Trust come in. In their sessions, students learn how to make a memorable speech about a topic they are passionate about, focusing on key ideas such as hand gestures, posture, eye contact and movement as they deliver a short speech in front of their peers.

From these sessions, each school chooses representatives who will improve their speeches and compete in the appropriate regional final. From the Ramsey Academy, the two representatives were myself (Tazmin Sloat) and Max Felton. After school on Thursday 9th May, we went to New Rickstones Academy in Witham, where this year's North Essex Regional Final was held. As the competition was due to start at half past six, we had a couple of hours in which a final session was held. In this session, all the contestants got to know each a little better and small final adjustments were made to the delivery of our speeches, making sure that we conveyed our passion and engaged the audience effectively. After that, it was time for the competition to start.

All the speeches made on the evening were spectacular: it was clear to see that the judges would have a hard time deciding a winner. My

## Training Expedition D of E Experience

In the morning, we used the heaters again but this time to make some breakfast which was porridge.



## Ramsey Academy Students take their Campaign to Unlock Education for Everyone to Parliament

On the 19th June, Tazmin and Max from Year 10 acted as representatives in Parliament for the national 'Send My Friend to School' youth campaign, calling on the UK to Unlock Education for Everyone.

World leaders have made a clear promise to ensure every child in the world gets a quality education by 2030. However, many children are 'locked out' of education simply because of who they are and where they live.

262 million children remain out of school around the world, excluded from education. To address this injustice, over 1000 schools and thousands of young people across the country are taking part in the Send My Friend to School campaign to 'Unlock Education for Everyone'. They are calling on the UK to lead globally, work with countries, and invest equitably in education.

Young people across the UK have been creating paper keys to depict the barriers to education that millions of other young people around the world are facing - including having a disability, being female in a place where gender discrimination is rife, living in a rural area, experiencing poverty or being caught up in an emergency.

They have added their own messages about why they think the UK should be a global education leader and sent these on to their MP.

Tazmin and Max were selected through a national selection process to champion the Send My Friend to School campaign as 'Campaign Champions'. Alongside 18 others they took this message to the heart of government through a Parliamentary Action Day - meeting with local MP James Cleverly, as well as other parliamentarians and ministers.

Tazmin said "It was an honour to represent the children across the UK who believe in standing up for a child's right to an education and talk to a variety of important MPs about the campaign. Not only did I come away from the day feeling proud that I had helped further the cause, but I also felt empowered, as I realised that no matter who you are, you are heard and your voice matters. I feel incredibly lucky to have had such an opportunity and I will remember my experience as a Campaign Champion for many years to come."

Max said "The overall experience was amazing, hearing the thoughts of many important people was really interesting. I am so glad that I got the opportunity to go along with the campaign".

I was exceptionally proud of both of them."

#### The Sex Factor

On the 20th June, as part of the school's statutory approach to personal, social and sexual health education, Tip of the Iceberg Theatre Company visited the school with their project "The Sex Factor". Year 9 students participated in a full day of theatre, workshops and discussions.

The focus of the day was about students taking responsibility for their choices and actions. Students had the opportunity to examine the difference between safe and unsafe behaviour and to explore how young people's personal experiences can influence this choice. They also discussed ways to empower young people to make informed and educated decisions about their lives and futures by highlighting the concepts of control, decision-making and self-esteem. Awareness was raised of teenage pregnancy, STI's, gender

identity, sexuality, and confronting complacency surrounding sexual health and to providing correct and relevant information.



Year 9 students responded brilliantly to this day, and understood the importance of taking responsibility for their own health and safety and

to seek the correct information about sexual matters, substance use and crime. The issue of sex was placed in the context of relationships relevant to young people.



This is the fourth year we have run this successful project, with the day aiming to empower young people to make educated and informed choices about their behaviour and their lives. It was clear that focusing on self-esteem, personal choices and decision making with the intention of exploring the causes and solutions surrounding teenage issues, was a relevant and valuable focus for our students. ## Hedingham Castle - History Trip

On Thursday 16th May, Year 10 History GCSE students visited Hedingham Castle - the site has been chosen as the topic of Local History that makes up a fifth of the grade awarded to students at the end of the GCSE course. The physical features of the castle are heavily focused upon throughout the course, hence why it was vital that the trip was conducted.

With the expertise of our History teachers from the Humanities Department, we were led through all five floors of the Keep as well as its elegant gardens. At the very top of the 110ft castle stood the remaining two of the four watchtowers that were originally built as a means of defence in the medieval time period. Underneath the roof was the dormitory floor which was where, before the addition of the mansion house in the Georgian era, the owners (the deVere family) and any highly important guests would have slept, often in alcoves. Beneath the dormitory floor was the minstrel gallery that stood just above the Banquet Hall - this was where musicians and entertainers would amuse the guests of the day during a ball. The Banquet Hall itself is reflective of the Norman time period in which it was built -

chevrons decorate the plasterwork of the arches and stone above the fireplace. The Hall is also host

to the largest arch in a domestic building in Western Europe - the 28ft arch in Hedingham Castle is highly impressive still even today. The penultimate floor is the garrison floor, which would have been where soldiers and blacksmiths were stationed. The basement at the bottom was originally used for storing food and water, and it is known that there was also a water well on this floor as well.

Of course, in the centuries since its construction, the Keep and the grounds have changed dramatically, hence the absence of the forebuilding and drawbridge, the stunning mansion house that sits not too far off and the intricate design of the gardens and the lake that surround the castle. These changes are also key to note, as they are reflective of the castle's owners within different time periods.

The trip was very insightful and has had an impact on the lessons surrounding the topic - it is a lot easier to link knowledge and subject specific terminology to the physical features that we have seen first-hand. Although the spiral staircase was a bit tricky to navigate, all enjoyed the trip - especially the photos and wrote some useful notes that will certainly come in handy in the future.
