Notes From the Head

Welcome to the final 2015 edition of the Ramsey Voice. We hope you have enjoyed reading about the success of our students and the wide range of activities in which they participate, both within school and the local community. Our aim is to be an outstanding school at the heart of the community, not only in terms of an Ofsted judgement, but based on the opinion of the people of Halstead and the local area. This view is growing and we are delighted to be oversubscribed with applications for entry into Year 7 for next September.

I would like to particularly draw your attention to the article written by David Iles, who is resigning as Governor before relocating to the West Country. On behalf of the students, parents and staff I would like to thank David for his contribution to supporting the Academy in recent years, enabling us to make the improvements to date.

Yet again the range of activities highlights opportunities for students and celebrates their achievements. We were delighted to welcome back former students to receive their GCSE certificates; these were presented by James Cleverly, MP for Braintree. The timing of the evening coincided with the release of national data highlighting the performance of the Academy compared to all schools in England. We were delighted with the results which showed that our students made significantly more progress than expected in a wide range of subjects (based on their ability when joining us from primary school).

In previous editions I have mentioned the intention to introduce and develop the Halstead Community Choir which has been supported by the Braintree District Council Mi Community Project. We are finally in a position to start the Choir which will hold its first session on Tuesday 5 January from 7.00 - 9.00 pm in the Main Hall. All ages and abilities are welcome to sing a range of classic rock and pop songs; no auditions are needed. As a special launch offer, the first four weeks are free of charge. Please come along, meet new people, exercise those vocal chords and have some fun!

The end of term has, as usual, been very busy with a range of activities. Year 11 students have completed their mock examinations and are awaiting their results. Unfortunately they will not be able to take much of a rest before returning in January to sit their real English Literature and ICT examinations. After this they will complete their preparations towards the GCSE summer examinations. The Academy were represented at the annual Remembrance Parade and the Torchlight Procession. In terms of music, the Choir performed at St. Andrew's Church with the Colchester Brass Band; led the singing at the annual Academy Carol Service and entertained the residents at a Residential Care Home. Students have enjoyed Christmas lunch with other members of their respective Houses and celebrated success at the end of term Achievement Assemblies.

I would like to thank all the students, parents, staff and Governors for their support during the year, supporting Ramsey Academy's continued development.

Science Observatory Visit Report


When we arrived at the Royal Observatory, we were astounded by the beautiful landscapes surrounding the area! Our first class consisted of studying how exoplanets, planets that don't orbit our Sun, orbited their sun! We did this by using practical equipment; polystyrene balls representing planets, a torch which represented the sun and a light sensor that allowed us to monitor the changes! We also learnt that if we discovered a planet ourselves, then our names could be scientifically published!

We were also given some time to explore the observatory ourselves; there were many interesting things to do, such as an interactive programme that allowed us to travel through space on a computer and learn about different stars and galaxies!

In our second class, we learned about telescopes and how they're used! We saw the structure of reflective and refractive telescopes and how different waves emit into them.

The best part of the day was the planetarium! We all filed into a cinema-like room, with comfortable seating that tilted backwards, so we could look up at the screen which was on the ceiling! As the lights dimmed and we were plunged into darkness, the screen came alive! The expert astronomer guided us through key constellations, different planets, our galaxy and much more whilst we all watched it on the big screen!

After taking pictures of the scenic landscapes, we all trooped back to the coach for the journey home! It was a fun, educational trip which we all thoroughly enjoyed! - Halimah Babor (Year 11)

Gardening Club

With the cold weather upon us, our allotment has been put to bed for the winter. We have completed our last minute weeding which will make our lives easier in the spring. The fallen leaves have been collected from around our site, and they will be left to rot down as leaf mould to be used in the 2017 season.

'Halstead In Bloom' has given us dozens of geraniums and begonias from the town displays. We have chopped them back to the roots and re-potted them to over-winter in our greenhouse. They are already forming leaves and showing healthy growth.

The damaged polytunnel cover will be replaced in the spring when the days warm up and get longer. Again, thank you to the Halstead WI for the £200 to make this possible.

Our pallet skull fundraising project has netted £90 for us. This will go towards compost and soil improver at the beginning of the year. I was delighted to show a representative of the Jack Petchey organisation around our site. They were pleased with the tools purchased with Noah Parkinson's award and the electronic irrigation system on our polytunnel supplied by James Donald's award.

We are preparing ourselves for the RHS Rocket Project next Easter and will report on our experiments soon after. New members are always welcome. Come along and see what we do! - Mr S Pittuck



Dracula Spectacular - Stage Scenery and Props

A small group of enthusiastic scenery and prop designers/fabricators are making steady progress in producing weird and wonderful props. A number of them look remarkably like Gardening Club members come in from the cold!

Using bits of pallet wood and other scraps, we have made 25 gothic candle sticks and a couple of stakes (well, it is a musical about vampires!)

We are in full production of wooden stage blocks, which can be put together to form scenery on stage. These will be used to mock up an aeroplane and the furniture from an inn. The sheet material for these 16 blocks has been financed by a £200 Jack Petchey award secured by one of our drama students. They can be used for future productions - a valuable investment for the future.

Mobile gravestones (on wheels!) are coming off the production line. We are having fun using our imaginations and trust that we have achieved the right amount of creepiness.

We will be very busy next term constructing a bridge, a mad scientist's lab, trapdoors and a painted backdrop.



Governor Pen Portrait

I have been associated with the Ramsey for three decades. My own four children attended the school, and, as Head of Richard de Clare, I sent half the Ramsey's annual intake of Year 7 students every September. I have always lived just a few minutes walk from the school and I have shared the community's hopes and aspirations for our children and young people.

Parents will know that a few years ago the school went through a very difficult period, culminating in a poor Ofsted. At that time I was working in a number of schools across Essex as a Consultant Leader, always hoping that I would have the opportunity to contribute more to my own local community, through Ramsey. That opportunity came when I was invited to join the new Local Governing Body and the Multi Academy Trust.

Since then, I have witnessed an amazing transformation.

Under the guidance and stewardship of Notley's then Executive Head Teacher, Simon Thompson, and Head Teachers Dan Gee and now Rob James, The Ramsey Academy, Halstead has shown itself to be one of the most improved secondary schools in the country. That is a remarkable achievement in so short a time.

This transformation has not happened by accident - indeed, the opposite is true. There has been a relentless focus on the part of Staff, Governors and Trustees to examine every aspect of the school and to improve it. The premises and resources have been improved to provide a working and learning environment worthy of our students in the 21st century. More importantly, there is a drive to improve the quality of teaching and of learning that drills down through every subject, in every lesson and for every pupil. Of course, the job will never be finished - developments can always be made, as the leadership and staff are well aware. One of the things that has impressed me most, as an experienced and successful practitioner, is how well Mr James and his staff have been able to put in place systems, policies and practices that make it so much easier for students to be successful - and how hard it will be in the future for anyone to slip through the net.

Being a Governor at The Ramsey Academy, Halstead over the last few years has been incredibly rewarding. The workload is not onerous and the responsibility is limited: the day to day management and running of the school is quite rightly vested in Mr James and his Leadership Team. We have a duty to support the school, but also to challenge what the school is doing, and thus ensure that it is on track to deliver the values and aspirations of our local community - that's why we have a Local Governing Body, after all. You don't have to be an expert to be a Governor. My own background has enabled me to contribute on Special Educational Needs and on Safeguarding, but we have a true mix of experience, expertise and interests within the Governing Body. There are no cliques or sub groups: everyone has one purpose and one only which is to allow every student and member of staff to achieve their potential.

I would venture to suggest that the students attending The Ramsey Academy, Halstead - your children - represent Halstead's most important asset. It is vital that the school continues to be successful, week in week out: the future of the town depends upon it. I have always been immensely proud to be a part of this community, and I have always been in awe of our young people and what they can achieve. I am now more confident than ever that under the leadership of Mr James, and with the support of the Governors, we will be able to give those young people the start to life that they so richly deserve. - Mr David Iles

Art Trip

On Friday 27 November we went to Colchester Zoo to collect and create images and sketches to help us to add more pattern, texture and detail to our artwork, as well as having a first-hand view of all the animals and researching them further. We mainly focused on spots and stripes (patterns) and sea life; our research on sea life will go towards helping us create a final piece and adding more detail to the work in our sketch books. When we got there we went into a room that had different parts of animals in, such as: alligator skulls, tigers and cheetah fur, snakes and spiders' skin, shells and coral, seahorses and sea urchins, turtles and insects. This allowed us to get close up pictures and ask any questions we had to find out more about the animals.

While we were looking at the animals we made small sketches in our sketch books and explored different ways of drawing them: at the same time we were thinking about what media we could use to create more detailed drawings of them. After the zoo trip we put together two A3 pages of sketches, paintings and studies that we had collected. The Ramsey Academy Orienteering Team

The Ramsey Academy Orienteering team are consistently successful in their sport. Recently they competed in the British Schools Championships, resulting in the Year 11 girls' team winning silver and the whole team finishing in third place. For the past 5 years, since the team was formed, they have always been placed in this competition which includes teams from all over the country. They have travelled as far afield as Scotland to compete.

The team regularly represent the Academy in league events and travel to different regions in East Anglia to compete against other schools. As a small school, The Ramsey Academy, Halstead are competing against some much larger schools, but the students consistently get placed in their classes, gaining points which are then totalled up at the end of the orienteering season when medals and trophies are presented.

The East Anglian Schools' Championships at Hylands Park this year, was the most successful ever for the team. Fifteen members took part and every age category won medals including gold, silver and bronze.

This shows the level of commitment given by students, not just competing, but in the training sessions available to them. They represent the local club, the Essex Stragglers, and some of them have been selected to represent the East Anglian Junior Squad. Orienteering has grown into a very popular sport. It tests both mental and physical abilities. Competitors must navigate themselves around a course, finding electronic checkpoints along the way in the correct order. All this, of course, is done against the clock! Getting a control in the wrong order will result in the score being void. There are different colour courses depending upon the difficulty, and will cover different distances from around 1.5km to around 7.5km. Students can be running across parkland one week and forests of Thetford the next.

November and December Netball Tournaments


Unfortunately the Year 8 tournament had to be cancelled due to bad weather; this will be played in January. The date will be confirmed.
