This has involved various presentations from local post-16 providers; interviews with a Careers Advisor and visits to a number of information events at different institutions. As a result we often host visitors, such as the chef from Colchester Institute, who worked with students in a practical skills workshop. This not only supported their GCSE studies but gave them a valuable insight into the nature of a potential career in the catering industry.

Progress towards our aim of 'being an outstanding school in the heart of the community' can be seen in the range of extra-curricular activities reported in this newsletter. Staff and students

PARC Donation

Colchester Institute Cooking Road-Show



A few weeks ago all the Year 10 catering students were visited by a chef from Colchester Institute and he showed us how to prepare and cook certain foods, even letting us try some dishes.

First of all he showed us how to prepare a whole chicken and all the different parts that we could use and eat. He showed us how to break the legs of the chicken and then separate them from the rest of the body. Then he put them all in a pile including chicken thighs, legs and breast.

After a break he showed us how to prepare a fish: it was fascinating to see how he took the fish scales off and how he removed the eyes and fins from the body. He gave us tips along the way to make sure the fish was fresh and ready to be cooked.

He then offered us a small dish of stir fry which was delicious, followed by some fabulous brownies.

In the couple of hours that we were taught by him,

the whole class appreciated his skill and learnt new and different skills that we could use to improve our own dishes. I personally thought the food that he cooked was delicious and the whole thing was a bit of a learning curve because if I use his tips, along with cooking high-level dishes in my GCSEs, I think I can achieve a high grade.

Year 11 Leavers

Now is a very important time for Year 11 students, not only as they prepare for their exams but also as they attend their college and sixth form interviews and start making important decisions about their next steps. If any students have not yet applied to college, there is still time to do so. There is a wide variety of courses on offer for all levels of ability. It is recommended that students have a backup plan and therefore accept more than one college or sixth form place, waiting until their results are issued before making their final decision.

For any Year 11 students considering an apprenticeship now is a good time to start researching local vacancies. An apprenticeship is a way for a young person to gain fully recognised qualifications whilst being employed. Students need to be sure that they are ready for full time work and are confident that the type of work they are entering is suited to them. Students can choose to do an apprenticeship rather than full time college. Apprenticeships are available in all types of industries including: business administration, health care, childcare, graphics, marketing, mechanics, catering, sport etc.

Governor Pen Portrait - Malcolm Bailey

A number of people have said to me over the years, 'Why are you a School Governor and what are the benefits?' Good question, but easily answered.

I first became a School Governor at my daughter's primary school. She is now studying to become a Primary School teacher and I am still on that Governing Body having been its Chair for over five years. The role of Governor has changed a great deal over the years, but without doubt it is one of the most rewarding roles that I have taken on. There are over 300,000 school governors around the country, making it one of the largest volunteering groups in the UK.

I have recently retired after working over thirty nine years in the banking industry, principally for one bank, although for the last three years I have been at one of the new 'challenger banks', which was a very exciting time.

Governing bodies require volunteers that are able to bring various skills to help perform its core duties. You do not need formal qualifications to become a School Governor, just a good experience of life and a strong commitment to support the school.

One of the three core responsibilities of a Governor is to oversee the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent and with my experience in this sector I can help support the Academy. Being on a governing body is now similar to being on a board of directors of a limited company. It is a Corporate body

that has to fulfil its statutory obligations ensuring that the right questions with the appropriate level of challenge are made at the right time. But what other benefits do I also enjoy? One of the greatest areas of satisfaction is working with like minded people to positively impact the lives of school children.

I became a Governor at The Ramsey Academy nearly two years ago and I have thoroughly enjoyed the time that I have spent getting to know the school and the community. The school, under the leadership of Mr James and his team has continued the excellent work of the previous head and its success is evident in the positive ethos and commitment to learning within the school and in its results.

Each Governor at the school takes on an area of curriculum responsibility and I volunteered to take on a subject which was a passion of mine when I was at school: Mathematics. I have met with the Head of the Department a couple of times with another planned shortly and I find these visits very helpful in my role.

Undoubtedly, with the country still under the grips of various austerity measures there are a number of challenges that the Academy will face over the coming years but I am very confident that The Ramsey Academy will continue to flourish and be one of the best outstanding secondary schools in Essex. - Mr M Bailey
