## Survivor's Story

On Thursday 26th January, Year 9 attended a webinar with Holocaust survivor Ruth Posner. This was part of the activities for Holocaust Memorial Day, which is a nationally-celebrated event.

Ruth grew up in Warsaw, Poland. When the Nazis invaded Poland, Ruth and her family were rounded up and detained in the Warsaw Ghetto, where conditions quickly became horrific. Many Jews starved or died from the infectious diseases which swept through the inhabitants.

Ruth's father managed to arrange for her to be smuggled out of the ghetto and she was given work in a leather factory.

Once outside the ghetto, Ruth was cared for by an aunt and had to assume a new identity as a Polish Catholic called Irena.

Despite having escaped from the ghetto, Ruth's life got even more difficult when the Poles of Warsaw were rounded up to be used as slave labour in Germany following the Warsaw uprising. Ruth was taken to work in Essen, which was frequently bombed by the allies. In a particularly-brutal bombing raid, Ruth and her aunt managed to escape their captors once again, and took refuge with a family of German farmers who agreed that in return for work, they would shelter

them. At the end of the war Ruth was sent by the Kindertransport to England, where she later married and became a dancer.

Ruth's aunt also managed to survive the war, but her children were not so fortunate. Ruth's aunt had managed to get her children taken in by a farming family to hide their Jewish identity. Sadly, the children were denounced to the Gestapo and were taken outside of the farmer's home and shot at the ages of six and eight.

The webinar was a valuable opportunity to hear first-hand from a survivor. These are Ruth's thought on why it is important to talk about the Holocaust.

"I carry this burden in my heart all the time because I have no family. I didn't want to talk about my experience, and I didn't want people to feel sorry for me.

"But what made me talk about it - and even scream about it - is the resurgence of anti-Semitism.

"People say it didn't exist. It's because of the trouble we have with Palestine and Israel, how Judaism has been mixed with those complex issues, it has fuelled antisemitism. I said, no. Now, I am going to scream about it wherever possible. I am going to talk about it."

On February 28th, Year 8 students experienced a visit to the Tower of London.

Three coaches and the minibus set off at 7.45am from Ramsey and made good time getting to London shortly before 10am.

Once wristbands were distributed, it was time to split into small groups to explore the Tower and its many exhibits.

Pupils were able to explore the Medieval parts of the site, and were able to see the recreation of King Henry's bedroom.

Pupils also visited areas of the site where prisoners had carved elaborate pictures into the wall - it was certainly far more intricate than modern graffiti!

The pupils were able to look at the torture instruments used in the tower and see where people were beheaded.

The white tower contains many suits of armour and the pupils particularly liked seeing Henry VIII's armour and his son Edward's, which was very small.

On the top floor of the White Tower pupils were able to have turns on the interactive exhibits to see how accurate their musket firing and sword skills were.

The highlight of most students' day was visiting the Crown Jewels. The pupils were amazed by the amount of gold and diamonds on display, lots of which will be used during the coronation of Charles III in May.

The pupils were extremely well behaved on the trip and certainly made the staff incredibly proud of them.

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




## MagnificentMilana!


Competing in the Pentathlon is one of the toughest challenges for any athlete, with five events over one day, including 60m hurdles, long jump, shot putt, high jump and finishing with the 800m.

Ramsey Academy student Milana Thorpe, a member of Chelmsford Athletics Club, took part in this year's England Athletics UK national combined indoor championships in Sheffield - pitting herself against the best U15 athletes from across the UK. After a good start, coming fifth overall in the hurdles, a PB in the long jump of 4.97m moved her into second place, which she held on to with another PB in the shot putt of 9.16m.

On to high jump, a height of 1.41m moved Milana into third place, which left it all down to the 800m to keep her place on the podium.

Another PB of two minutes 29 seconds finishing second secured her a third place medal and a massive overall PB of 3102 points, 275 more than her previous PB in december in the South of England Championships where she came second overall.

Milana now has her sights set on the outdoor season and English Schools where a top four place would earn her an England shirt competing in the international championships in december.
