GeographyFieldwork

Over the past couple of weeks, year 10 have been out completing their physical and human fieldwork for their GCSE Geography.

Our physical fieldwork took us to Walton on the Naze, where we studied long shore drift and coastal erosion. Students we all very excited when I told them that we were going to be throwing oranges into the sea and that we were also going to be measuring pebble size! The students were all brilliant and showed their enthusiasm for geography (and in some cases for Disney music!) Overall, the data that we collected will be helpful in preparing for the paper 3 exam next year.

Our other fieldwork was completed at Stratford in London, comparing the new East village with the older area of the Carpenters Estate. Recently a group of Year Ten Health and Social Care students visited Anglia Ruskin University in Chelmsford for the morning to attend an NHS and Social Care Expo.

The students got the chance to experience what it was like to have dementia and autism by visiting buses that replicated the experience. They attempted to work together to complete different tasks and follow a series of instructions.

They also visited a careers fair where many health and social care careers were represented. Students got to chat to the professionals and look at the materials and resources they had bought with them.

After this, they learned about giving first aid and had a chance to practise this on a CPR training kit. Next, they had the opportunity to speak to ARU medical students and have a go at using some medical equipment.

Finally, they spent some time in one of the lecture theatres where they got to hear from social workers, an operating theatre practitioner and a pharmacist about their careers and the journey they went on to get to where they are today. It was a really positive and interesting day where the students did a lot in a short space of time. This was topped off by some excellent singing in the minibus on the way back to school!

This term Year 10 visited Hedingham Castle as part of their History Around Us GCSE. They saw the influences of different time periods on the site from the medieval period to modern day. Hedingham Castle was built in 1140 for the de Vere family, a very powerful Norman family. It was used during the medieval period as a symbol of their power and control and played a big role in the Barons' War. During the Tudor period, it was famously visited by Henry VII, who had been helped by John de Vere during the War of the Roses. John de Vere wanted to show Henry his beautiful new bridge, however, Henry VII wasn't impressed by the number of servants that John had and fined him!

The site changed hands to the Ashhurst family during the Georgian period and a fine Mansion House was added, as well as the gardens, dovecote and lake. Now the site is used for an open-air theatre, an escape room, weddings, and of course... school trips.


Our students said this about their day...

Raise Your Childs Attendance Raise their Chances!

Do you know what your child's attendance is?



1 school year at 90% attendance = 4 whole weeks of lessons MISSED!!! 90% attendance over 5 years of secondary school.... a school year missed!

Green - Your barrier to achieving excellence is your engagement with lessons

Amber - You are likely to miss information because of your attendance, making it difficult to achieve excellence

Pink – you are at risk of not achieving excellence because of your attendance. Red – You will be missing vital information, making it difficult to catch up work and achieve excellence because of your attendance. This often leads to a negative spiral of attendance and achievement.

What is the school doing to help?

As a school we are rewarding students' attendance:

100% attendance for a week, students get house points and we have been completing random name draw, selecting 5 students from each house to win spot prizes.

Tutor groups have received rewards of sweets or cookies for the highest attendance as a tutor group. Tutor groups have received sweets if they have the least number of lates, or the most students with 100% attendance, or have shown the most improvement. We change the criteria each time.

What can I do as a parent to help?

Talk regularly with your child about school and how they feel about it. More likely to attend if they feel supported and anxieties listened to.

Be watchful and supportive in the run up to tests and deadlines.

Tips to help secure good attendance

catch up with missed work.

Help them

Know **routines** of the school **day** e.g. have they got their PE kit?

Only grant days at home for genuine illness.

PRAISE for good attendance.
