As a member of the Ramsey book club, we collectively decided at the beginning of the term that we would read "This Tale Is Forbidden," penned by Polly Crosby. Compared to other books I have been asked to review; this young adult book has genuinely left an imprint on me. Books are a way to go on holiday on your bedroom room floor, and be transported to another world, but the authorial intention goes beyond the superficial of keeping a reader's attention from page to page and getting them to pick it up at the bookstore; it's also to change perspectives, challenge ideas, and enlighten lives.

#### Plot

The YA fantasy novel "This Tale Is Forbidden" is based on adolescent Nesta, the protagonist, who has known nothing other than her life in the enchanted woodlands where magic remains, a place removed from society. Against her grandmother's previous warnings, she ventures into the city in search of her grandmother, who has been kidnapped by the authorities. The authorities are the oppressors in the city. Nesta is portrayed as an outsider who has been thrust into an alien environment. Nesta knows the truth. That makes her dangerous.

This book is as if George Orwell and Hans Christian Andersen had a book child; it's a cautionary tale but has an underlying theme of supernatural, magic, and mythical fairytales. This is for any fan of feminist, supernatural dystopian books.

#### Course of Action

The opening of the book is very intriguing and mysterious, introducing at once the conflict and driving force of the story: the disappearance of her

grandmother. The events of the story are formed in thin strands of information that eventually become inextricably intertwined to create a stunningly crafted story.

Crosby handles time in this novel in an interesting way. Nesta experiences ancient visions called the clamouring that transport her back to memories in the past.

#### Role of Nesta and Patriarchy

The story is written in first person from the perspective of Nesta, a 15-year-old girl from the woods. This choice of story frame means we feel all of Nesta's emotions and are immersed in her thoughts. This choice of Crosby's is effective, as we do not have that detached or neutral perspective of another character (the indoctrinated society of the city). This means the reader feels her contrast in mindset to the standards of cultural influence and structure. We feel her flow of consciousness and rationality, and Nesta's age being in an impressionable and naive yet progressing stage of her existence means she could be seen as a very strong heroine, as she doesn't change or get tempted into coercion and submission around her. She is a role model for any person, be that boy or girl. This is a feminist tale; however, the character of Nesta can be used as a vessel to show what a powerful person really is. She has complete autonomy over herself, meaning she is not changed by what everyone expects of her and has built a fortified inner citadel. In comparison, the dictator of the city, Jack Bellwether, is a man who is insatiable and, in order to feel complete, exploits nature and forcibly controls his people.

Nesta also shows her disobedience to the status quo as well as her threat and power through her channeling of the clamoring, as this is a part of the magic that was outlawed in the city. Nesta being bestowed this could be used as a lesson of framing and perspective as she sees it as power, but in its naked form, it can drive one mad, and her taming of it makes her unstoppable.

In juxtaposition to this power that Nesta has, we do feel sympathetic toward her, perhaps as Crosby intended. This is because she, as well as the rest of the female sex in the story, are being unjustly prosecuted throughout. Nesta is simply outspoken and believes in equality and is being punished for it, perhaps suggesting that timid, demure women are preferred and favoured. Crosby also is very focused intently on the theme of patriarchy. A disclaimer that in the UK, I would go so far as to say that we are a very tolerant country; however, in some countries around the world, women are unfortunately suppressed. Their ethos was to appeal perhaps to the men who have historically had societal strength; for example, they had the vote before women, have a significantly bigger salary than women, and they typically performed physically demanding tasks, such as plowing and hunting, thus gaining a dominant position. Women had to comply...

#### Nature and Setting

The settings change throughout the story from the untouched landscape of the woodland, a tranquil home for Nesta and all that she's ever known, to an industrial, contemporary, patriarchal society. Wolves are also a prevalent symbol throughout the story; they are seen as a safeguard to the forest, as the character of Nesta was told by her grandmother they were not to be feared.

In one chapter, when Nesta follows her impulse and ventures to the city hall, statues of wolves are seen with their heads bowed and their tails between their legs. This could be a motif of how humanity has abused nature and has forced nature and made them vulnerable and surrender essentially to our control... of their lives

#### Areas for improvement


A way that Crosby would expand her novels reach as it informs on paramount issues in the world, by editing could develop more ambitious vocabulary and more vivid descriptions as the narrative should not be overshadowed by the message. Readers in general have


an affinity to beautiful language and that is what truly differentiates a classic revered on a personal bookcase that transcends through several generations, to a dusty book on a library shelf.

#### **Closing Words**

In conclusion, "This Tale Is Forbidden" is an amazing book, and I would describe it as evolved nostalgia. Companies like Disney have made films from these fairytales that are now very well known. They have made millions from these narratives; feel free to try, so many corporations have, and yet we never get tired of them. The comparison to Disney's adaptations of fairy tales highlights how Crosby's work offers a fresh, subversive take on timeless traditional fables that first connect with the reader, that flip the story, Nesta's world, and your view on its head.




