Year 9 have been learning about the Women's Suffrage movement in their History lessons this half term.

As part of their studies, some Year 9 groups have taken part in an online learning session hosted by Historic Royal Palaces. The sessions focused on the story of Princess Sophia Duleep Singh. Pupils were introduced to Princess Sophia and 'visited' her at three key points in her life. Princess Sophia became engaged in the fight for equality in India, and on returning to England joined Emmeline Pankhurst's Suffragettes.

Sophia was a prominent Suffragette and could regularly be found selling their newspaper outside Hampton Court Palace. She took part in the protest which became known as Black Friday due to the police brutality aimed at the women involved. Sophia managed to escape imprisonment due to her high status, but continued to actively campaign for the Suffragettes until the outbreak of WW1. Pupils actively participated in the session and the



hosts were really impressed with their knowledge and maturity. Well done Year 9!



Next, we visited Lijssenthoek Cemetery where students marvelled at the many marble

gravestones set in neat lines next to each other. We next visited the Baynerwald trenches which students loved to walk around and see the interesting things placed in the trenches to help the soldiers such as the kennels soldiers went inside to sleep, cook, or eat food.

After a long day of walking and sitting on the coach we went to our hostel called "De Lep" where we were all excited to settle in, have a bit of a rest, and catch up with friends in our rooms. After a quarter of an hour of being at "De Lep" we had our evening meal at 6pm which was very kindly provided by the staff working at the hostel.

Shortly after dinner we went back onto the coaches to watch the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin

Gate. The ceremony was nice and lovely to hear the talented soldiers/musicians play the music. After the ceremony had finished, we all walked in a group back to the hostel having fun looking at the places we would be visiting tomorrow in our free time. When we arrived back at the hostel, we had some free time in the hostel games room and our dorms. Most of the students went down into the games room to buy drinks and talk about their day and have fun with their friends.

At 10pm we headed back to our rooms to have a last chat with the people in our dorms and get ready to sleep before 10.30pm, when the lights were turned off and we went to bed.

Day 2

We awoke early in the morning to get ready for the busy day ahead of us. We had a nice breakfast at 8am, which was once again kindly provide by the staff working at our hostel.

An hour later we checked out of the hostel, full up from breakfast, with a packed lunch prepared for the way back. Everyone was in awe at how sombre the German Langemark Cemetery was, especially compared to the other cemeteries that we had visited. Meanwhile, we split into groups to go around the museum which really gave us an insight into the lives of the soldiers during the war. The groups then swapped so that everyone got to witness the unique experience that each place held. Both coaches then headed off to Ypres for free time, where everyone enjoyed going into all the chocolate shops!

After the free time was sadly over, we all started the journey back home. Again, everyone was impressed at the amazing manoeuvring of the coach drivers when we boarded the Eurotunnel. We all enjoyed stretching our legs and having a chat with our friends from the other coach during the Eurotunnel ride. We then had a great journey back to Halstead and arrived back home at 8.15pm. Very tired but very happy after our long two days of fun.




