Attendance is critial! There is a direct link between those with good attendance (95%+) and improved GCSE/A Level grades. In fact, for every day of school missed, pupils are likely to lose £750 in future earnings.

In order to avoid unnecessary disruption to learning, we ask that all students take the opportunity to use the toilet and re-fill water bottles before school and during lunch and break.



VE DAY

This week we have been celebrating the 80th anniversary of V E Day. The week began with a visit from 3 residents from Colne View Care Home who were able to talk to the pupils about their memories of the war. On Thursday we had a full day of activities. Pupils came to school in non-uniform and in the process raised £400 for the British Legion. Lessons had a WW2 theme which included parachute testing in Science, medal designing in Art and WW2 improvisations in Drama. In History lessons, Year 7 and 8 worked hard to create a scale model of a WW2 tank and we were visited by Mr Legg who kindly provided a vast number of WW2 artefacts and 2 authentic military vehicles for the pupils to learn about and interact with. At lunch time we had a concert in the Triangles and there was special V E Day food available in the Canteen. - Mrs Perrins

What is Wicked Writers: Be the Change?

Wicked Writers is a persuasive writing competition inspired by the themes of Wicked the musical, which gives pupils a chance to have their voice heard and to win some exciting prizes in the process.

This year, we asked pupils aged 9 to 14 to write persuasively about a positive change they would like to see in their local community. This could be anything from environment to mental health to social justice – it just needed to be local! Making a positive change is a key theme in Wicked and is the subject of the song For Good.

In 2025, we were lucky to have an incredible judging panel, including Cressida Cowell, bestselling author of How to Train Your Dragon and a former Waterstone's Children's Laureate; Manjeet Mann, award-winning author of The Crossing and Run, Rebel; and Jonathan Douglas, CEO of the National Literacy Trust.

We are absolutely thrilled to share some fantastic news from our English faculty – Ollie in Year 7, has been officially shortlisted for the 2025 Wicked Writers: Be the Change competition!

This national writing competition had thousands of entries from across the country, so being shortlisted is an incredible achievement – and we couldn't be prouder of Ollie!

Ollie's entry stood out for its originality, powerful voice, and heartfelt vision for change. Judged by an impressive panel including Cressida Cowell (author of How to Train Your Dragon), Manjeet Mann (author of Run, Rebel), and Jonathan Douglas (CEO of the National Literacy Trust), Ollie's writing truly made an impact.
